THOUGHTS FROM THE CHAIRMAN



2018 ended on the saddest of notes with the news that Alan Baker, one of the League's Vice Presidents, passed on the very last day of the year. Many of the longer servants associated with the Surrey Cricket League will fondly remember Alan as the ' Mr. Cricket of Old Tenisonians CC' and a true legend of the club based in Motspur Park. OTCC were one of the 30 original and founder member clubs which formed the current league back in 1975 and Alan was an integral playing and social member of that club for many years. After his playing days were over, he still maintained a very active and avid interest in his club right up to the present day. Alan loved the game and his passion and wealth of knowledge soon became of interest to the League's committee members of that era. In particular by Tony Hodgson, our League's co-founder and current President, and Alan was welcomed on board with open arms.

Alan served in a range of roles from Vice President (1979-1981), Chairman (1982-1998) to becoming President from 1999 to 2012 and he continued to maintain an active interest in how the League was progressing. The cricket world in Surrey has lost not only a true gentleman but a local legend who participated in a way that the game should be played; with honesty, competitiveness and most of all in a sporting manner. Alan epitomised the 'Spirit of Cricket' and truly lived the game he loved. He will be sorely missed, and our condolences extend to his family and close friends.

As a legacy moving forward and to acknowledge his tremendous service to this

League, the Executive Committee have decided to name a trophy in a tribute to his memory and it is to be called the 'Alan Baker Trophy'. This new trophy will be awarded each season to the best panel umpire.

The "summer" of 2018 was a stark contrast to that of the previous two seasons. After a damp May we probably experienced one of the hottest periods in recent memory. Three solid months of glorious weather enabled both cricket in general and players to flourish and was a major contributory factor in another tense and competitive campaign for divisional honours.

In the Premier Division, with the demise of the 2017 champions Old Pete's CC announced just a few weeks before the new season commenced, it would mean a new name on the trophy for 2018. Sutton Challengers CC took up the challenge from the start and led the way throughout the whole season only to fall on the final day. A defeat to arch rivals, Croydon CC, meant a runners-up slot with that slip up allowing Surrey Seamers CC to creep up on the blind side and secure the Divisional title for only the 2nd time in their history.

Division 1 saw a very competitive season with several clubs challenging for the top spots. No one club could break away and the lead changed hands several times right up until the latter stages when the position started to clarify. In the end the title went to London Gymkhana CC after the likely winners, Ottershaw & Hamm Moor CC, were deducted 40 points for a disciplinary implosion in late August. As a direct result of this penalty, the



title was lost and opened the way for Clapham Old Xaverians CC to secure the runners-up slot in this division.

Three teams had a realistic chance of honours in Division 2 throughout the season, but it was Ploughmans CC's consistency that finally clinched the winners title narrowly pipping Croydon 'A' CC who secured the runners-up position and subsequent promotion.

The presentation of club and individual awards took place at the League's Annual Awards Dinner held at a new venue, Curry Leaves in New Malden. Our President, Tony Hodgson, presided over yet another successful and well-attended evening and kindly presented all the club trophies and individual awards to the respective winners.

The John Lloyd Sportsmanship Trophy, awarded to the club attaining the top sportsmanship marks across all divisions, was presented to Ploughmans CC. As Division 2 winners this combined award really does reflect that you can still be successful, play competitive cricket but remain sporting at the same time and is a lesson to others on how the game should be played. This was an fabulous achievement for one of our more progressive clubs which was recognised by their divisional peers.

The final presentation, the Derek Guppy Award for services to the League, went to David Jackman and was richly deserved. David is one of our very fine band of panel umpires and his commitment and availability to the League since he joined the Umpires Panel in 2011 has remained unwavering in spite of some difficult moments in his umpiring development which have only gone to strengthen his determination.

As is the SCL tradition, an entertaining evening concluded with our famous raffle and it's usual array of many fabulous prizes.

2019 sees no personnel changes within the Executive Committee so I am delighted to be able to continue to chair such a dedicated and committed group of cricket lovers whose common aim is to continue its ethos of 'Cricket for All' and

make our League the very best it can in serving our loyal member clubs. I would, as always, like to place on record how grateful I am to each and every one of the Committee who continue to serve our member clubs with distinction. It really cannot be overstated enough how lucky our clubs are to have such a conscientious committee at their disposal.

In turn, my thanks also go to the vast majority of our Club Representatives who continue to support the Executive Committee, and in particular Robin Ford our League Secretary, in their own dealings with all the varied aspects of League business. This vitally important and integral role, as the link between club and committee, is pivotal in ensuring the League's continued smooth operation.

As mentioned at the AGM in January of this year, I am pleased to report that the financial cost saving benefits to our member clubs in reduced league fees for a 7th season running, cricket balls, public liability insurance and VAT savings when utilising the League's ground block booking arrangements are once again extended for a further season. Ongoing prudent financial management of our funds will allow us to continue our committee aims of keeping club's league costs to an absolute minimum wherever possible in these difficult times.

2018 saw a continued and welcomed reduction in the level of severe incidents of poor sportsmanship and ill-disciplined behaviour which is always positive. That is not to say that there were no incidents at all, which of course would be the ideal scenario, but the few that did materialise were dealt with in the strongest possible manner to serve as a distinct deterrent to those that think they can still operate outside the game's basic parameters. Whether this improving trend is more by luck than design, the Executive Committee's strong determination to punish persistent miscreants, or due to more captains' awareness brought about by training forums regarding the raft of new and revised MCC Laws and Playing



CHAIRMAN'S REPORT

Conditions introduced for the 2018 season, is unclear. However, what I wish to make abundantly clear is that there is to be no place within our League for any club or individual player who wishes to buck this trend and ruin the enjoyment of playing for others on a Saturday afternoon. The Executive Committee will continue with its resolve to stamp out bad and unacceptable behaviour of any description and, as always, our focus will again be on those few clubs who fared badly in last season's divisional sportsmanship tables.

2019 will reflect one of, if not, the biggest changes to our playing format since the formation of the SCL. Continued angst over the number of wide deliveries being experienced in the lower divisions over recent seasons has led to much discussion and many a vote which has, to date, seen a reluctance for change. However, this season, to compensate for team captains' continued inability to increase the tempo of the game and bowl more than the 'expected' minimum of 15 overs per hour, coupled with player umpires overzealous approach to any delivery outside the off stump, matches in Divisions 1 and 2 are being reduced to 40 overs per side on a trial basis.

The SCL divisional structure for 2019 will see us with 30 teams in three divisions of 10 giving us a balanced format after the usual close season's comings and goings of new arrivals and leavers. Croydon CC elected to join the Fullers County League. This newly formed club has made enormous progress in its time within the SCL since joining in 2015 and will be taking two of their three XIs with them. Their 3rd XI will remain with us and they will be adding a 4th XI for this coming season. The departure of Croydon from our Premier Division is further exacerbated by the demise of Wandsworth CC whose membership dates back to 1994. The club under the charismatic guidance of their orchestrator, Haroon Ayyub, are to take a 12-month sabbatical from the game with the intention to return in 2020. Our final departure sees Ewell CC remove their 3rd XI after only one

season in the SCL.

Our unique policy of accepting newly formed clubs where others fear to tread remains a tradition that this League is immensely proud of. No other pathway exists in Surrey which accommodates embryonic new clubs into the grass roots level of cricket, and I am delighted to announce that four such examples will be joining us this season. For 2019, we welcome Crawley Trinity CC, Team Mitcham CC, Ahmadiyya Muslim Youth (AMY CC), and Surrey Warriors CC who will be entering two XIs. Other additions will see Wimbledon Corinthians enter a 2nd XI together with a former club, Merton CC electing to place their 3rd XI with us.

My grateful thanks go out to all of our supporting partners and the contribution they make to the League's ongoing success. To Guy Gravenell and Mike Oban at Radio Jackie, now into a 6th year, for their ongoing support and awards sponsorship; to Lords International, now entering the final year of the current agreement as our ball supplier; and to the Management and Groundstaff at Kingston University for the continued use of their excellent facilities at Tolworth Court. I would also like to thank Paul Taylor, Simon Hards, Chevy Green and the support staff at the Surrey Cricket Foundation for their invaluable assistance, together with Paul Bedford, the ECB's National Participation Manager, whose guidance emanates from Lords.

We enter our 45th operational season in reasonable shape and optimistic mood in readiness for what proposes to be a fabulous season of world cricket ahead of us. Your Executive Committee is ready and prepared, focused to the future and fully concentrated on what we do best to secure the continued well-being of the SCL. I sincerely hope that with the continued backing of our member clubs we can carry on with our heritage and proud traditions for many years to come.

Enjoy the season ahead. My best wishes to you all.

CHANGES TO THE LAWS OF CRICKET – 2017

The following is a brief summary of the key Law changes. The complete summary can be found at <https://www.lords.org/assets/Uploads/Law-Summary-Paper-updated-28-June.pdf>

Handled the Ball

This has been removed and any unlawful handling the ball by the batsman is now obstructing the field.

No Balls

All runs scored from a no ball are recorded as 1 no ball plus whatever is scored. For example, 1 no ball and the batsman hits it and runs 3, it is 3 to the batsman and 1 no ball, likewise for byes and leg byes.

If a ball bounces more than **ONCE** before the popping crease it shall be a no ball.

Substitutes A sub fielder may now keep wicket.

Penalty Time If a player is absent while his/her side is fielding, unless in exceptional circumstances or if the absence was caused by an external blow during the match, that player will incur Penalty Time equivalent to the total time spent off the field, which is the time he/she will have to spend on the field before being able to bowl or, if the innings ended meanwhile, bat. The rolling over into the batting innings is a new concept for the Laws, as is the differentiation of an external blow, which is easier for the umpires to monitor. The player must 'serve' the same time that he/she was absent, to a maximum of 90 minutes. Unlike the previous Law, however, there is no grace time at all (a player under the 2000 Code could be off the field for up to 15 minutes without penalty), meaning a player who leaves the field for one over cannot come back onto the field and immediately bowl.

Run Out if the batsman grounds the bat (held by the hand) or another part of his/her person within his/her ground (the elbow when diving, for example), and provided that the batsman has continued forward momentum, and subsequently inadvertently loses this contact with the ground when the wicket is put down, the batsman will be protected from being Run Out in the same way as under the previous Law. In addition, the same protection will apply to a striker diving back into his/her ground to avoid being Stumped. The most common instances when this will be needed are when a batsman has dived for his/her ground or when the bat hits a bump while 'running it in' and becomes airborne.

Caught A change has been made so that the ball can be caught after it strikes a helmet which is being worn by a fielder or the wicket-keeper.

Distraction by Fielders Law 41.5 Deliberate distraction, deception or obstruction of batsman. This is the Law that prevents a fielder from deliberately distracting or obstructing a batsman after receiving the ball. An increasing practice considered unfair is 'mock fielding', where a fielder feigns to field the ball and/or feigns to throw a non-existent ball in an attempt to prevent the batsman running. Therefore, the words 'deceive' and 'deception' have been added to this Law to cover both mock fielding and any other act which deliberately aims to deceive the batting side.

Discipline The suspension and removal of players is limited to matches with umpires.

REPORTING RESULT AND COMPLETING SCORECARD

REPORTING MATCH RESULT

HOME TEAM to report the result of the match on the club Play-Cricket website by midnight of the day of the match by entering:

- the result,
- team scores,
- wickets down (a team with less than 11 players is “all out” ie 10 wickets down, if the last wicket falls)
- overs bowled, and
- bonus points of losing team (the winning team is automatically credited with 20 points).

This also includes matches which are abandoned, incomplete or conceded.

Use the highlights box to indicate any unusual circumstances, eg reduction of overs, and players who have scored at least 50 or taken at least 5 wickets.

Should the Play-Cricket website be “down”, the above details must be either emailed or text to the General Secretary at secretary@surreycricketleague.co.uk or 07931 822686.

COMPLETING SCORECARD

HOME TEAM to complete the match scorecard on the club Play-Cricket website by midday of the Monday following the match.

AWAY TEAM to complete the scorecard on the club Play-Cricket website by midday of the Tuesday following the match. This applies whether or not the home team has completed the scorecard.

All parts of the scorecard must be completed:

- Names of all batsmen (leave space blank if less than 11 players)
- Scores of each batsman
- Names of all bowlers and fielders who took catches, stumpings and run outs
- Number of byes, leg-byes, wides and no-balls
- Scores at time of fall of wickets and the names of the batsmen
- Bowling figures

Except for the opponents' players' names, the Batting Team is responsible for the completion and accuracy of the details on their batting card including the bowlers' figures.

The above details must be completed for abandoned matches where the game had started.

SUSPECT BOWLING ACTION

Surrey Cricket has developed a package to analyse a player who has a suspect bowling action and to address any problems identified. A club or individual can contact either The Surrey Cricket Centre (Guildford) or The Ken Barrington Cricket Centre (Kia Oval) for help. They will receive an initial session (up to one hour in duration) in which a senior coach will film their action from both front and side on angles and provide initial feedback. The coach will then analyse video footage and write a report, highlighting the issues involved. This will be reinforced with still footage from key action points. Remedial measures will be highlighted.



ECB GUIDELINES ON JUNIOR PLAYERS IN OPEN AGE CRICKET

The ECB has issued guidance covering the selection and participation of young players in open age group cricket. This is to help clubs decide when to select young players in open age group cricket and how best to help their cricketing development when they play within open age groups. The ECB keeps these guidelines under review and, following feedback from clubs and leagues, has revised these guidelines for the 2011 season. The ECB will continue to monitor the impact of these guidelines and you are invited to feedback your thoughts and comments in writing to the ECB Non-First Class Cricket Department.

The guidance will apply to boys and girls and any reference to he/his should be interpreted to include she/her. Age groups are based on the age of the player at midnight on 31st August in the year preceding the current season.

The guidance is as follows:

- Making the step up from junior to open age group cricket is a significant event in any player's cricket experience. Ensure the player's safety, personal development needs and overall cricket experiences are considered.
- There is no definitive age at which a player should be introduced to open age group cricket, but each case is to be determined on an individual basis, depending on the player's ability and stage of cognitive and emotional maturity to take part at this level. That said clubs, squad coaches and managers must take into account the requirements on age detailed in the last bullet of this guidance.
- ECB Fast Bowling Directives and Fielding Regulations should always be adhered to for junior players in open age group cricket.
- Provide an opportunity for players to show their talents in an appropriate way. Children who are just used as fielders will not fully experience the game.
- Be supportive, at all times, for all forms of effort even when children are not successful. Try and put them in situations where they will experience some success (however small) and ensure plenty of praise and encouragement.
- Try and involve them in all aspects of the game wherever possible, eg. socialising, team talks, practice, decision making and so on, so they feel part of the team.
- Children will often feel more comfortable and able to perform if they have a family member or friend also playing in the side.
- Remember, children's early experiences will remain with them always and will often determine whether they want to remain playing the game or give up and do something else.
- Players who are selected in a County U12 squad in spring for a summer squad or in another squad deemed by ECB Performance Managers to be of a standard above 'district level' for that season are eligible to play open age cricket. This is providing they are at least 11 years old, are in School Year 7 on 1st September in the year preceding the season, and have written parental consent to play. In allowing these players to play in open age cricket it is essential clubs and coaches recognise the 'duty of care' obligations they have towards these young players



JUNIOR PLAYERS

This means boys and girls who are county squad and area squad players, are able to play open age group cricket if they are in an U12 age group and are a minimum of 11 years old on 1st September of the year preceding the season. District and club players who are not in a county or area squads must wait until they reach the U13 age group, be in Year 8 and be 12 years old on 1st September of the preceding year before being able to play in any open age group cricket. As before written parental consent is required for these players.

The duty of care should be interpreted in two ways:

- Not to place a young player in a position that involves an unreasonable risk to that young player, taking account of the circumstances of the match and the relative skills of the player
- Not to create a situation that places members of the opposing side in a position whereby they cannot play cricket as they would normally do against adult players

In addition, the guidelines note the need for clubs and leagues to recognise the positive experience young players should have in open age cricket. Clubs should provide an opportunity for players to show their talents in an appropriate way. Children who are just used as fielders will not fully experience the game.

Guidance for Clubs and Leagues

All clubs must recognise that they have a duty of care towards all young players who are representing the club. This duty of care also extends to Leagues that allow the participation of young players in open age groups in their League. The duty of care should be interpreted in two ways:

- Not to place a young player in a position that involves an unreasonable risk to that young player, taking account of the circumstances of the match and the relative skills of the player.
- Not to create a situation that places members of the opposing side in a position whereby they cannot play cricket as they would normally do against adult players.

In addition the following specific requirements apply to young players in open age group cricket:

- All young players who have not reached their 18th birthday must wear a helmet with a faceguard when batting and when standing up to the stumps when keeping wicket. Parental consent not to wear a helmet should not be accepted in open age group cricket. A young player acting as a runner must also wear a helmet even if the player he is running for is not doing so.
- The current ECB fielding regulations must be adhered to and enforced by the umpires and captain. The umpires are empowered by these fielding regulations to stop the game immediately if a young player comes within the restricted distance.



- The umpires and the opposing captain must be notified of the age group of all players participating in an open age group cricket who are in the under 19 age group or younger even if the player is not a fast bowler. This requirement also covers any young player taking the field as a substitute fielder. The ECB Team sheet cards are freely available to facilitate this.
- Any player in the Under 13 age group and younger must have explicit written consent from a parent or guardian before participating in open age group cricket. Clubs must ensure that consent is obtained. The policy for changing and showering must be adhered to.
- Any club wishing to play a player in an open age group League or Cup match must obtain the explicit approval of the League or Cup Management before the player can play. Approval should only be given to exceptionally talented players. It is recommended that advice is sought from the County Age Group Coach or other ECB Level 3 coach as appropriate.

Clubs and Leagues can apply more strict restrictions on the participation of young players in open age group cricket at their discretion. It is strongly recommended that a parent, guardian or other identified responsible adult is present whenever a player in the Under 13 age group or younger plays in open age group cricket. This could include the captain or other identified adult player taking responsibility for the young player.

PROTECTIVE HEADGEAR

In November 2015, the ECB endorsed changes to the regulations governing the use of helmets across the professional and recreational game. From 2016, all male and female cricketers playing in professional cricket matches will be required to use helmets which meet the latest British Safety Standard. The key changes will apply to batsmen facing all types of bowling, wicket-keepers standing up to the wicket and fielders closer than eight yards from the batsman's middle stump, except behind the wicket on the off side.

The ECB also strongly recommends that all recreational cricketers wear helmets which meet the latest British Safety Standard from next season. The use of protective headgear is already mandatory for all under 18s within the recreational game.

The full list of helmets meeting this standard (BS7928:2013), is available at www.ecb.co.uk/helmets.

Helmets should be replaced after they have received a significant impact.



Discipline

ROLE OF THE DISCIPLINARY COMMITTEE

The Disciplinary Committee will ensure that the cricket played in the League is competitive, fair and sporting. The Committee (and the Chairman, acting alone on behalf of the Committee) have the power to sanction breaches of discipline by punishing the offending club, players and/or the team captain. In line with ECB Disciplinary Regulations, breach of Code of Conduct will be categorised as Level 1,2,3,or 4 as set out in Appendix 1 at the end of this chapter.

The following kinds of transgressions will be addressed by the Committee:

Players' behaviour: Failing to comply with the instructions of an umpire, criticising his decision by word or action, showing dissent, using abusive language, or generally behaving in a manner which might bring the game and/or the name of the League into disrepute.

Accumulated bad behaviour: Repeated infringements by an individual of the Spirit of the Game (where it is decided that each infringement in itself does not merit any immediate disciplinary action). Repeated infringements by a team are likely to result in the captain being held responsible for the conduct of his team (whether or not individual players are identified for disciplinary action). When issuing the penalty, the Chairman or the Disciplinary Committee may take into account poor team discipline in previous years, particularly where the on-the-field captain held the same position in those previous years. Captains bear responsibility for their own on the field behaviour as well as that of their team members.

Violence: There is no place for any act of violence on the field of play. Proven cases of violent conduct will result in expulsion from the league.

Racial Abuse: Players and team officials must not make any racially abusive comments nor take racially abusive actions against fellow players, officials, members and supporters.

ECB Code of Conduct and the Spirit of Cricket: Any breach of the Code of Conduct and the Spirit of Cricket.

Club Members and Supporters: Non-playing members and supporters are the responsibility of the club and any cases of misconduct will be dealt with by the Chairman or the Disciplinary Committee accordingly.

Social Media: Players and club officials shall not make any public or media comment which is detrimental to the League, clubs, umpires or the game in general. In this instance, media shall include press, radio, television, external websites, club websites, social networking sites and club match programmes.



DISCIPLINARY PROCESS

The fast track Disciplinary Process will be decisive and efficient.

A) Matches with panel umpire(s)

The Panel umpire(s) will submit a comprehensive match report to the Chairman of Discipline and to the clubs league representative by no later than the Sunday evening following the match if there was cause to report a player or a club. Umpires are the sole judges of fair and unfair play; their judgment of any poor conduct by individual players or the team will be final. The Chairman of Discipline is empowered to issue appropriate penalties to individual players or the team. The decision will be notified to the relevant club by Tuesday of the same week or soon after and in the case of Level 1 and Level 2 breaches penalties will be applied immediately. A Level 3 and Level 4 complaints will automatically be subject to a full Disciplinary Hearing. In the case of violent conduct, the player(s) involved will be suspended from playing cricket with immediate effect pending an investigation and disciplinary hearing.

Note: If a panel umpire is not appointed, process B) below will apply.

B) Matches with club or player umpire

The Captain or the League Representative will submit a comprehensive match report to the Chairman of Discipline and to the League Representative of the opposing team by no later than the Sunday evening following the match if there was a cause to report a player or a club. The recipient (the League Representative or the Captain) must submit a response to the report by the end of the Wednesday following the match to the Chairman of Discipline. Having considered the documents he has received within the timeframes set out above, the Chairman of Discipline is empowered to issue appropriate penalties to individual players or the team. The penalties will be applied as soon as possible thereafter. The League Representative will be informed of the effective date of the penalties. A Level 3 and Level 4 complaints will automatically be subject to a full Disciplinary Hearing. In the case of violent conduct, the player(s) involved will be suspended from playing cricket with immediate effect, pending an investigation and disciplinary hearing.

Disciplinary Hearing

A disciplinary hearing in a case involving violent conduct will be notified in writing to the League Representative of the relevant member clubs with at least 7 days' notice. Any adjournments may be granted at the discretion of the Chairman of Discipline. The player(s) concerned and the member club shall be entitled to attend the hearing and state their case (a member club may only be represented by its League Representative or other club official). They may each be supported by one colleague and may call witnesses. The hearing will be conducted by the Disciplinary Committee of the League which shall consist of no fewer than three persons, none of whom shall be connected with the player, the club or the opponents.



DISCIPLINE

Penalties

The Chairman of Discipline shall have the power to impose one or more of the following penalties, together with such order as to costs as he deems appropriate:

- (a) In the case of a player:
- To require the player to submit an appropriate letter of apology within a specified time
 - To record a reprimand and to give a warning as to future conduct
 - To suspend the player for one or more matches or for a stated period of time
 - To deduct League points from the player's team
 - To expel the player from the League.
- (b) In the case of a member club:
- To require the club to submit an appropriate letter of apology within a specified time
 - To record a reprimand and to give a warning as to future conduct
 - To impose a fine
 - To deduct League points from the clubs team(s)
 - To relegate the clubs team to any lower division of the League
 - To expel the club from any competition of the league
 - To expel the club from the League.
- (c) In the case of violent conduct, the player(s) concerned will be suspended with immediate effect and the matter investigated thoroughly. A disciplinary hearing will take place once the investigations are completed.
- (d) Any decision to suspend a player will be communicated to his teams opponents scheduled to play the team during the suspension, to the leagues umpires, and reported to the Surrey Cricket Board for national circulation. Suspensions will cover the appropriate number of League games played to a result, including rearranged fixtures.
- (e) Violent conduct hearing: The Disciplinary Committee shall have the power to suspend the operation of any part of or the entire penalty it imposes for such period and subject to any terms that it deems appropriate. Decisions of the Disciplinary Committee, a finding that a complaint is proved or otherwise or a decision on penalty shall be by a majority vote. Where necessary the Chairman shall have a casting vote.
- (f) Any decision to expel a player or a club will be communicated to Surrey Cricket Board and other Surrey Leagues, after an appeal process if applicable.
- (g) As a guideline, the following penalties should be expected to be imposed for any complaint referred and, if appropriate, proved at a disciplinary hearing:

Appeals Procedure

1. A player or member club shall have the right of appeal to the Appeals Committee. The notice of appeal must be given in writing (by email) setting out the grounds of appeal to the League General Secretary within 7 days of notification of the decision and a fee of £100 must be sent immediately. If notice of appeal is given the penalty shall not take effect pending the hearing of the appeal, which shall take place as soon as is practicable.
2. The appeal shall take the form of a hearing before a different committee. The composition of the committee shall be at the discretion of the Chairman of the League and shall consist of no fewer than three persons none of whom shall be connected with the player, the club or the opponents, or who sat on the Disciplinary Committee. The player or the club shall have the same rights of attendance as they had before the Disciplinary Committee.
3. The Appeals Committee may confirm, vary or reverse the decision of the Disciplinary Committee and it shall have the power to increase or reduce the penalty and award costs of the appeal hearing. The decision of the Appeal Committee shall be by majority vote; where necessary the Chairman shall have the casting vote. The decision of the Appeals Committee or, if no appeal, of the Disciplinary Committee, shall be final and binding.
4. In the event of a successful appeal, the fee shall be returned in full. If the appeal is unsuccessful, the appeal fee shall be forfeited unless the Appeals Committee considers that, in the circumstances of the case, the fee should be returned in full or in part.



DISCIPLINE

APPENDIX 1 – BREACHES OF DISCIPLINE

Certain conduct, whether on or off the field of play of play, amounting to a breach of the Laws of Cricket and/or the Spirit of Cricket has been categorised into 4 levels which are set out below:

Level 1

- (a) time wasting by either the fielding side or the batting side
- (b) abuse of the cricket ground, equipment or fixtures
- (c) showing dissent at an umpire's decision by word or action
- (d) using language that is obscene, offensive or insulting and or the making of an obscene gesture
- (e) excessive appealing

Level 2

- (a) showing serious dissent at an umpire's decision by word or action
- (b) inappropriate and deliberate physical contact between players in the course of play
- (c) charging or advancing towards an umpire in an aggressive manner when appealing
- (d) deliberate and malicious distraction or obstruction on the field of play, regardless as to whether such conduct is deemed to be fair under law 42.5
- (e) throwing the ball at or near a player, umpire or official in an inappropriate and dangerous manner
- (f) using language or gesture that is obscene or of a serious insulting nature to another player, umpire, team official or spectator
- (g) changing the condition of the ball other than as permitted by Law 42.3
- (h) the bowling of fast short pitched balls that result in the bowler being disallowed from bowling further in that innings
- (i) causing avoidable damage to the pitch contrary to Laws 42.13 and/or Law 42.14 that results in a five run penalty being awarded

Level 3

- (a) intimidating an umpire
- (b) threatening to assault another player, team official or spectator
- (c) using language or gesture that offend, insult, humiliate, intimidate, threaten, disparage or vilify another person on the basis of that person's race, religion, sexual orientation, colour, descent or national or ethnic origin
- (d) the deliberate bowling of any high full-pitched ball contrary to Law 42.8

Level 4

- (a) threatening an umpire
- (b) physical assault of another player, umpire, official or spectator
- (c) any act of violence on the field of play
- (d) using language or gestures that seriously offend, insult, humiliate, intimidate, threaten, disparage or vilify another person on the basis of that person's religion, sexual orientation, colour, descent or national or ethnic origin.

The conduct listed in Level 1 to Level 4 above cannot be considered to be exhaustive.





RULES

1. TITLE

1. The League shall be called the Surrey Cricket League (hereinafter referred to as the League).

2. INTENTION

1. The intention of the League shall be to:
 - promote and organise cricket on a league basis, with the object of playing club cricket competitively;
 - maintain the spirit of the game as it exists both on and off the field; and
 - ensure a duty of care to all players in the league by adopting and implementing the ECB “Safe Hands – Welfare of Young People in Cricket” policy and any future versions of the policy.

3. DISSOLUTION OF THE LEAGUE

1. Should the viability or credibility of the Surrey Cricket League, for whatever reason, become unsustainable, the standing Executive Committee at that time, in conjunction with the member clubs within, will have it within their power to dissolve the League.
2. To alleviate the possibility of ANY individual or individuals benefiting materially or financially from such a decision, be they on the Executive Committee or as a member within, all assets of the League, to include shackles, equipment and monies, will be donated to various fully Registered Disabled sports related charities with priority, where possible, being given to such organisations that fall within the playing footprint of the Surrey Cricket League. Any such relevant donations will be made at the sole discretion of the standing Executive Committee at that time along with at least four independent members from separate clubs within to be appointed / elected at the closing EGM or AGM of the League.
3. Final accounts, once all debts have been paid and monies owing have been received, will be fully audited by an accredited Accountant and a Solicitor will be appointed to ensure that all honest and legal procedures in place at that time have been followed and carried out.

4. COMPOSITION

1. The League shall consist of an unlimited number of clubs, but a minimum of ten
2. Clubs with no home ground shall not be admitted to or allowed to continue in the League.
3. Each club must be affiliated to the Surrey Cricket Board.
4. Each club shall have current public liability insurance providing an indemnity limit of at least £5 million, evidence of which shall be provided to the Executive Committee prior to the start of each season. A club without current public liability shall not be permitted to participate in the League and any fixtures which are not honoured shall be conceded to its opponents.





RULES

5. ADMINISTRATION

1. The general administration of the League shall be vested in the Executive Committee which shall consist of the following officers:
 - Chairman
 - Vice-Chairman
 - General Secretary
 - Treasurer
 - Fixtures Secretary
 - Umpires Panel Chairman
 - Discipline Committee Chairman
 - League Statistician
 - Development Officer
 - Welfare Officer
 - League Club Liaison Officer
 - Website Administrator
2. No club may have more than one of its members serving on the Executive Committee.
3. The Executive Committee shall have power to conduct any business, other than that required to be transacted at a General Meeting. They shall be empowered to provide for any contingency that may arise and not covered in the rules and playing conditions. Where such action is necessitated, any decision reached by the Executive Committee as a direct result shall be final and binding. There will be no recourse of appeal to any such determination made.
4. The Executive Committee shall appoint members to the following sub-committees as and when necessary:
 - Fixtures and Statistics – to arrange the league fixtures and co-ordinate players statistics;
 - Discipline – to investigate all disciplinary matters;
 - Match Officials – to appoint and support the panel umpires;
 - Rules/Playing Conditions – to investigate any alleged breach of rules and playing conditions, and keep under review and propose amendments to the rules and playing conditions;
 - Press, Social and Welfare – to produce the annual handbook, arrange publication of results and tables in local papers, to arrange the annual presentation dinner, and deal with welfare issues; and
 - Grounds and Pitches – to oversee the quality of clubs' playing facilities.
5. All sub-committees shall report back to the Executive Committee.
6. The Executive Committee shall meet as they deem necessary, and a quorum at such a meeting shall be five members. Any officer holding two posts may only have one vote. In the event of a vacancy occurring on the Committee, it shall be filled by invitation.





6. GENERAL MEETINGS

1. The Annual General Meeting shall be held during January. The General Secretary shall give not less than three weeks' written notice to member clubs' League Representatives together with a copy of the League's financial report. The meeting shall be attended by all current member clubs. The following shall be the normal business of the Annual General Meeting:
 1. to receive audited accounts for the year ended 31 October.
 2. to elect Executive Committee members for the ensuing year, and to appoint auditors.
 3. to consider any proposed amendments to the League rules and playing conditions.
 4. to consider items submitted to the General Secretary, in writing, at least four weeks prior to the date of meeting.
2. The Spring Meeting shall be held during April at which the League handbooks and match balls shall be distributed. The General Secretary shall give not less than three weeks' written notice to member clubs' League Representatives. The Meeting shall be attended by all current member clubs.
3. A Special General Meeting may be called at three weeks' notice by the Executive Committee or on application to the General Secretary in writing. Such application shall bear the signature of the League Representative of not less than five full member clubs, and shall state the purpose of the meeting. The meeting shall take place within four weeks' of the receipt of such an application and the General Secretary shall give not less than three weeks' written notice to member clubs' League Representatives. The Meeting shall be attended by all current member clubs.
4. A quorum for any General Meeting shall be not less than half of the full member clubs.

7. VOTING

1. Voting at all meetings and special meetings shall be decided by a simple majority. Each full member club shall have one vote. The Executive Committee shall have one vote. In the event of a tied vote the Chairman of the meeting, who shall not otherwise vote, shall have the casting vote.



RULES

8. FORM OF THE LEAGUE

1. Each game shall be played according to the Laws of Cricket as issued by the MCC and in accordance with playing conditions of the League. The organisation and the playing conditions of the League shall be laid out under "Playing Conditions".
2. On completion of a season, with the exception of the Premier Division, the top two teams in the remaining divisions shall be promoted to the next higher division. Any promotion shall be conditional on that team's permanent home ground meeting the higher division's minimum ground standards as set out in Rule 9 and applicable at the time. With the exception of the lowest division, the bottom two teams in each higher division shall be relegated to the next lower division.
3. Promotion from Division 1 shall be subject to the team having a minimum "B" grade for its permanent home ground.
4. The promotion and relegation provisions set out in this Rule may be varied for any season, provided this is determined before the season in question commences.
5. In the event of a club(s) withdrawing or being expelled from the League during the season they shall have their record expunged. Any suspended club will get no points for the game(s) they are suspended but the game(s) will count in calculating their average points.

9. GROUNDS

1. Each member club shall have a permanent home ground for each of its teams which meet an acceptable standard for cricket in the League. The League Grounds Committee shall decide whether a ground is acceptable or not.
2. The Grounds Committee shall inspect each ground and score it according to the criteria below with an overall grade of "A", "B" or "C". A team shall not be promoted to the Premier Division if its ground grading is not a minimum of "B". If a Premier Division team's ground grading falls below "B" then at the end of that season the team shall be relegated to Division 1.
3. In the event of a club wishing to change its home ground either permanently or for any League match, it shall first seek the approval of the Grounds Committee.

RULES

10. FINANCE

1. Finance shall be provided by annual subscriptions from each member club as agreed at the AGM.
2. All clubs shall pay an annual subscription of £150 and an additional £50 for each extra team.
3. Annual subscriptions shall be paid by 1 March. No club shall be entitled to participate in the Competitions until the said subscription or any other monies due to the League are fully paid. Any club unable to participate in the Competitions under this rule shall get no points for games forfeited but the games will count in calculating their average points.
4. This subscription includes 15 handbooks for clubs with one team and 10 extra books for each extra team. All member clubs shall purchase at least two tickets for the League Annual Presentation Evening.

11. FINES

1. A fine of £50 will be incurred by a member club for failure to attend the AGM, the Spring Meeting, or a Special General Meeting.
2. A fine of £25 will be incurred by a club which fails to:
 1. attend the annual awards evening to receive an award won by its team or player.
 2. return to the Executive Committee the cup competitions Cup and Trophy by 30 June and the divisional winners and runners-up cups by 31 August. Should a trophy be lost or damaged whilst in the possession of a club, the club will be required to meet the cost of replacement or repair.
3. A fine of £25 will be incurred for failure to submit the following by the due date, providing three weeks notice is received:
 1. League fees.
 2. details of club officials form.
 3. home fixture dates form.
 4. cricket ball order form.
 5. presentation evening tickets form.
4. Penalty points:
 1. Failing to record the result of a cricket match by midnight on the day of the match – 5 points penalty to the HOME team.
 2. Failing to update the Play-Cricket website scorecard by midday (12pm) on the Monday following the match – an additional 5 points penalty to the HOME team.
 3. Failing to verify the scorecard, amending or completing as necessary by midday (12pm) on the Tuesday following the match – 5 points penalty to the AWAY team.
 4. Any missing information and/or incorrect information – 1 point penalty will be imposed for each error up to a maximum of 5 points. This will apply to both teams.
5. Failure to provide a League specified cricket ball shall incur a fine of £10.
6. Failure to deal with all other League business by the required date shall incur a fine of £10.
7. A fine must be paid within 14 days of issue. The fine shall be doubled if it is not paid by the due date.





8. Any club failing to settle outstanding payments to the League after 28 days shall be suspended from playing within the League until full payment has been received by the League Treasurer.

12. ENTRY INTO, EXPULSION, AND WITHDRAWAL FROM THE LEAGUE

1. Any application for membership of the League, including those from existing members wishing to add a further XI, shall be made in writing to the General Secretary and be received by the closing date of 31 October for entry into the next season. Applications submitted after this closing date shall only be considered for the next season if the number of the proposed clubs/teams, the divisional format, and the scheduling of fixtures allows for such contingencies. The application must be accompanied by an entry fee of £100 only refundable if the application is unsuccessful. All new applications shall be decided by the Executive Committee. Newly accepted teams shall be allocated to a division at the discretion of the Executive Committee.
2. A club accepted into the League shall become an Associate Member from the date of notification. It shall have observer status at the League's meetings (AGM, Spring or Special General Meeting) and shall only then be able to vote on achieving Full Membership as outlined in 12(3) and 12(4) below.
3. At the end of the club's first full playing season its performance will be evaluated by the Executive Committee against the following factors:
 - Disciplinary record;
 - Sportsmanship and relationship with other participants; and
 - Administration, including communication with the Executive Committee and dealing with League business.
4. Subject to a satisfactory evaluation by the Executive Committee at the completion of its first full playing season, an associate member club shall be granted Full Membership status confirmed at the next AGM. An associate member club shall have no voting rights until it becomes a full member.
5. Should the evaluation be unsatisfactory, the Executive Committee may extend the club's associate membership a further year, or expel the club from the League. Should a club's evaluation be unsuccessful a second year, the club shall be expelled from the League.
6. Following a review based on the criteria listed in sub-paragraph 12(3) above, any existing member club or a certain team from a club may be expelled at any time from the League or be subject to other punitive action by the Executive Committee, whose decision shall be final and binding.
7. Withdrawal from the League shall require notice in writing by 30 September prior to the season commencing. Withdrawal after that date will incur a fine of £100.

13. ALTERATION TO RULES

1. No alteration shall be made except at the AGM, the Spring Meeting or a SGM. Any proposed alteration must be received by the General Secretary in writing by 30 November prior to the AGM or 28 February prior to the Spring Meeting. The proposed alteration shall be circulated with the notice convening the meeting.





PLAYING CONDITIONS

1. COMPOSITION OF DIVISIONS

1. The composition and format of each division shall be at the discretion of the Executive Committee.

2. FIXTURES

1. All fixtures shall be arranged by the League Fixture Secretary. Any changes to the fixtures issued to member clubs shall be advised to the affected clubs by the League Fixture Secretary. If a club wishes to change a planned fixture the League may consider a possible re-arrangement. However, there is no guarantee that such a request will be granted and any proposed re-arrangement will be subject to (a) the agreement of the opposition, (b) a suitably approved venue being available, and (c) an alternative date during the season being available. It will be the responsibility of the club wanting a fixture to be re-arranged to seek the agreement of their opposition, to arrange a suitable pitch and alternative date, and to notify the Fixture Secretary for approval. Once published in the League handbook no fixture shall be altered except by permission of the League Fixture Secretary.
2. Unless weather or unforeseen circumstances intervene, each team in a division of ten or less teams shall play every other team in that division twice per season, home and away. Each team in a division of more than ten teams shall play every other team in that division once per season. Where practicable, in those divisions home and away matches shall be equal.
3. All league matches are to be played on Saturdays only and as far as possible will run consecutively from the first Saturday in May and to be completed by the second Saturday in September. Any league fixture outside those Saturdays may only be arranged with the consent of the Executive Committee and both clubs involved. The League Fixture Secretary will endeavour to ensure that all XIs of a club will play on the same dates.
4. Where a club has two teams participating in the same division, the League Fixtures Secretary will arrange for the match between the two teams to be played within the first two weeks of the season. If the teams are in a division where matches are played home and away, the first match will be arranged in the first two weeks of the season and the second will be arranged in the first two weeks of the second half of the season.
5. It is the responsibility of the Home team to ascertain that the ground is fit for play in the event of any doubt due to bad weather. Before the scheduled start time, the decision of whether a ground is fit for play is the responsibility of the ground authority or, in the absence of a groundsman, the home team. Once the scheduled start time has been reached, the appointed umpires or the captains shall be the judges of the fitness of conditions for play, in accordance with the Laws of Cricket as issued by the MCC.





3. ARTIFICIAL PITCHES

1. No Surrey Cricket League matches may be played on any artificial pitch without the express permission of the Executive Committee and be subject to the prior inspection and agreement of the Grounds Committee.

4. DURATION OF THE GAME

1. IN THE PREMIER DIVISION, the duration of the game is to be decided by 45 overs being bowled by each side, or until a side is dismissed whichever is sooner. No bowler may bowl more than 9 overs. Any over or part over bowled by a bowler in excess of the stipulated 9 overs shall stand. If the error is discovered during the course of an over, that over shall be completed by a different bowler and shall then count as a complete over for him.
2. IN THE LOWER DIVISIONS, the duration of the game is to be decided by 40 overs being bowled by each side, or until a side is dismissed whichever is sooner. No bowler may bowl more than 8 overs. Any over or part over bowled by a bowler in excess of the stipulated 8 overs shall stand. If the error is discovered during the course of an over, that over shall be completed by a different bowler and shall then count as a complete over for him.
3. All games are subject to the following ECB fast bowling directives:
 1. The captain of each side in every match shall ensure that no player under the age of 19 shall bowl more overs in a spell or in a match than is allowed by the most recent fast bowling directives published by the England and Wales Cricket Board, namely:
 - Up to 13 years old – 5 overs per spell and maximum 10 overs per day
 - Under 14 and under 15 – 6 overs per spell and 12 overs per day
 - Under 16, under 17, under 18 and under 19 – 7 overs per spell and 18 overs per day.
 2. Age groups are based on the age of the player at midnight on 31 August in the year preceding the current season.
 3. In the event of any breach of this condition the captain of the side shall be liable to disciplinary action and his side forfeit all match and bonus points awarded in any match in which the breach(es) took place and shall suffer the additional deduction of up to 20 points for each match in which a breach occurred.

Over Rate Penalty

4. IN THE PREMIER DIVISION, unless the match is delayed by rain or there are exceptional circumstances accepted by the umpire(s) or agreed by both captains, the 45 overs shall be bowled within 3 hours. In a rain-affected match, the period in which the bowling side must complete their overs will be reduced pro rata in accordance with the time lost for that innings (see Playing Condition 7(2)). Should the bowling side fail to complete their overs within 3 hours (or the period reduced in a rain-affected match) they shall be penalised as follows:



PLAYING CONDITIONS

1. If the first innings' overs are not bowled within 3 hours, the batting side will still face 45 overs but the bowling side will have the number of overs not bowled within the 3 hours deducted from their 45 overs.
2. If the second innings' overs are not bowled within 3 hours the batting side will still face their full number of overs but the first innings total will be reduced by six runs for every over not bowled within the 3 hours.
5. An over in progress at the three hours' time limit will count as within the three hours.

Example 1

After 3 hours, side B has bowled 42 overs. Side A goes on to score 200-8 in their 45 overs. Side B's target to win is 201 in 42 overs.

Example 2

Side A scores 200-8 in their 45 overs within 3 hours. Side B has scored 180-7 off 42 overs after 3 hours. Side A's total is reduced to 182 ie 200 – (6 runs x 3 overs). Side B needs 3 to win off their final 3 overs.

Example 3

After 3 hours, side B has bowled 42 overs. Side A goes on to score 200-8 in their 45 overs. Side B's target to win is 201 in 42 overs. After 3 hours, Side B has scored 180-7 off 40 overs. Side A's total is reduced to 188 ie 200 – (6 runs x 2 overs). Side B needs 9 to win off their final 2 overs.

Example 4

Side A's innings is reduced to 35 overs (a loss of 10 overs) Side B must complete their overs in 2 hours 20 minutes, ie a reduction of 4 minutes per over.

6. IN THE LOWER DIVISIONS, unless the match is delayed by rain or there are exceptional circumstances accepted by the umpire(s) or agreed by both captains, the 40 overs shall be bowled within 2 hours 45 minutes. In a rain-affected match, the period in which the bowling side must complete their overs will be reduced pro rata in accordance with the time lost for that innings (see Playing Condition 7(2)). Should the bowling side fail to complete their overs within 2 hours 45 minutes (or the period reduced in a rain-affected match) they shall be penalised as follows:
 1. If the first innings' overs are not bowled within 2 hours 45 minutes, the batting side will still face 40 overs but the bowling side will have the number of overs not bowled within the 2 hours 45 minutes deducted from their 40 overs.
 2. If the second innings' overs are not bowled within 2 hours 45 minutes, the batting side will still face their full number of overs but the first innings total will be reduced by six runs for every over not bowled within the 2 hours 45 minutes.





PLAYING CONDITIONS

7. An over in progress at the 2 hour 45 minutes' time limit will count as within the 2 hours 45 minutes.

Example 1

After 2 hours 45 minutes, side B has bowled 37 overs. Side A goes on to score 200-8 in their 40 overs. Side B's target to win is 201 in 37 overs.

Example 2

Side A scores 200-8 in their 40 overs within 2 hours 45 minutes. Side B has scored 180-7 off 37 overs after 2 hours 45 minutes. Side A's total is reduced to 182 ie 200 – (6 runs x 3 overs). Side B needs 3 to win off their final 3 overs.

Example 3

After 2 hours 45 minutes, side B has bowled 37 overs. Side A goes on to score 200-8 in their 40 overs. Side B's target to win is 201 in 37 overs.

After 2 hours 45 minutes, Side B has scored 180-7 off 35 overs. Side A's total is reduced to 188 ie 200 – (6 runs x 2 overs). Side B needs 9 to win off their final 2 overs.

Example 4

Side A's innings is reduced to 30 overs (a loss of 10 overs) Side B must complete their overs in 2 hours, ie a reduction of 4 minutes per over.

5. START TIMES

1. The normal start time shall be 1:00pm (12:30pm from the third Saturday in August until the end of the season).
2. A match may start earlier or later providing:
 - both teams agree to the re-arranged start time;
 - the umpire(s), if applicable, also agree; and
 - the General Secretary, and the Chairman of the umpires' panel if the match has been allocated an umpire, are notified by both teams no later than 8:00pm on the Thursday before the match.
3. The new start time shall become the scheduled start time for the purposes of this playing condition.
4. For the purposes of this playing condition, a team shall comprise no fewer than eight players.
5. Any team with insufficient numbers as per 5(4) not at the ground 15 minutes before the scheduled start time shall forfeit the toss.
6. Any team not present and ready to begin the game by the scheduled start time shall forfeit two of their allotted batting overs for every further five minutes (or part of five minutes) until they are ready to begin the game. This reduction shall apply in full, even after the allotted overs are reduced in rain-affected games. At the toss the two captains shall confirm to each other how many players they expect to field.





PLAYING CONDITIONS

7. Any team not present and ready to begin the game by 45 minutes after the scheduled start time shall forfeit the match. The defaulting team shall be fined £150 which will be used to mitigate the opponents' quantifiable losses.
8. In Premier Division games, and all other games officiated by a panel umpire, before the start of the match each team shall complete an ECB Team Sheet and pass it to the umpire(s). In other games, before the start of the match each team shall complete an ECB Team Sheet and exchange with the opponents.

6. TEA BREAK

1. The tea break shall not exceed 30 minutes duration, and shall be between innings, unless otherwise agreed by mutual consent of both captains. The home team shall bear all the expenses of the tea.

7. DELAYED START AND INTERRUPTION DUE TO WEATHER OR BAD LIGHT

1. Should the start of the game be delayed, or the game be interrupted because of the weather or bad light, then the criteria set out in paragraph 7.2 shall apply, with a minimum of 20 overs being substituted for the full number of overs under Playing Condition 4 to decide the result of the match. Notwithstanding the previous sentence, should an innings be completed, or a target reached, within 20 overs, the match shall be completed. For example, Side A scores 86 all out in 19 overs and Side B scores 87-1 in 15 overs. Side B wins despite neither side facing 20 overs because a completed match has been played.
2. Fifteen overs should be deducted for every hour lost (every 4 minutes or part thereof lost = 1 over). For example, if 30 minutes' play is lost at the start of the game, 8 overs are lost – 4 per side. If in this example an uneven number of overs are lost, an additional over should be lost so that each side loses the same number. If 30 minutes' play is lost during the second innings, the team batting second will face 37 overs (Premier Division) or 32 overs (lower division) and the result will be decided on run rate. In the event of 2 sides having an unequal number of overs available, owing to interruption by weather, then the game shall be decided by their respective overall run-rates per over. In this connection:
 1. Where the side batting first is bowled out before its total allotted number of overs are completed, its total score shall be divided by its full number of allotted overs to determine its run-rate per over (see Example 2 below).
 2. Part overs shall be counted as completed overs.
 3. All bonus points accumulated during a match of reduced overs shall be retained.

**Example 1**

IN THE PREMIER DIVISION, Side A scores 225-6 after 45 overs when rain causes the game to be reduced to 20 overs for side B:

Side A's run-rate per over is 5 ($225 \div 45$)

Side B's target to beat in 20 overs is 100 (5×20)

IN THE LOWER DIVISIONS, Side A scores 200-6 after 40 overs when rain causes the game to be reduced to 20 overs for side B:

Side A's run-rate per over is 5 ($200 \div 40$)

Side B's target to beat in 20 overs is 100 (5×20)

Example 2

IN THE PREMIER DIVISION, Side A is bowled out for 90 runs off 30 overs when rain causes the game to be reduced to 20 overs for Side B:

Side A's run-rate per over is 3 ($90 \div 30$)

Side B's target to beat in 20 overs is 60 (3×20)

Or Side A is bowled out for 90 runs off 30 overs in a game already reduced to 35 overs each when rain causes the game to be reduced to 25 overs for Side B:

Side A's run-rate is 2.57 ($90 \div 35$)

Side B's target to beat in 25 overs is 64 (2.57×25) (ie more than 64.25)

IN THE LOWER DIVISIONS, Side A is bowled out for 80 runs off 30 overs when rain causes the game to be reduced to 20 overs for Side B:

Side A's run-rate per over is 2 ($80 \div 40$)

Side B's target to beat in 20 overs is 40 (2×20)

Or Side A is bowled out for 80 runs off 25 overs in a game already reduced to 30 overs each when rain causes the game to be reduced to 25 overs for Side B:

Side A's run-rate is 3.2 ($80 \div 25$)

Side B's target to beat in 25 overs is 80 (3.2×25) (ie more than 79.75)

Example 3

IN THE PREMIER DIVISION, Side A scores 180-7 off 45 overs. Side B has scored 135-5 off 30 overs when rain causes the game to be abandoned:

Side B wins by faster run-rate per over (4.5 against 4 of Side A)

IN THE LOWER DIVISIONS, Side A scores 180-7 off 40 overs. Side B has scored 135-5 off 25 overs when rain causes the game to be abandoned:

Side B wins by faster run-rate per over (5.4 against 4.5 of Side A).



PLAYING CONDITIONS

Example 4

IN THE PREMIER DIVISION, Side A scores 200-6 in 43 overs when rain interrupts play. After 10 minutes tea is taken and the rain continues until 20 minutes after tea, thus 30 minutes play is lost (8 overs):

Side A's run rate is 4.65 ($200 \div 43$)

Side B's target to beat in 39 overs is 181 (4.65×39)

IN THE LOWER DIVISIONS, Side A scores 200-6 in 38 overs when rain interrupts play. After 10 minutes tea is taken and the rain continues until 20 minutes after tea, thus 30 minutes play is lost (8 overs):

Side A's run rate is 5.26 ($200 \div 38$)

Side B's target to beat in 34 overs is 178 (5.26×34)

3. The maximum number of overs a bowler may bowl will be reduced pro rata to that of the number of overs of that innings reduced by the weather.

Example 1

IN THE PREMIER DIVISION, Side A's innings is reduced to 35 overs, Side B's bowlers may only bowl a maximum of 7 overs – $35 \div 5$ (the minimum number of bowlers required for a full 45 over game).

IN THE LOWER DIVISIONS, Side A's innings is reduced to 30 overs, Side B's bowlers may only bowl a maximum of 6 overs – $30 \div 5$ (the minimum number of bowlers required for a full 40 over game).

Example 2

IN THE PREMIER DIVISION, Side A's innings is reduced to 27 overs, Side B's bowlers may only bowl a maximum of 6 overs – $27 \div 5$ (5.4 rounded up to 6)

IN THE LOWER DIVISIONS, Side A's innings is reduced to 22 overs, Side B's bowlers may only bowl a maximum of 5 overs – $22 \div 5$ (4.4 rounded up to 5)

Notes:

1. Maximum overs per bowler is 9 in the Premier Division; 8 in the lower divisions.
2. If a match is reduced before a ball is bowled then above figures will apply to both sides.
3. If a match is reduced after one side has completed their innings then the above will apply to the side bowling second.
4. If the match is reduced after a bowler has completed his overs, then his overs count and the remaining overs due to be bowled are shared between the remaining bowlers.
5. The reduced overs from 44 to 40 refer only to matches in the Premier Division.



PLAYING CONDITIONS

8. FAILURE TO HONOUR A FIXTURE

1. Should a team fail to honour a fixture, their opponents will be adjudged to have won and will be awarded 20 points. The team cancelling it will not receive any points.
2. Any team failing to honour a fixture shall be fined £150 which will be used to mitigate the opponents' quantifiable losses.
3. Any team failing to honour more than two fixtures in a season shall have its continued membership of the League reviewed by the Executive Committee. If it is determined that the team shall be expelled from the League under this playing condition (or if a team withdraws from the League during the course of the season) all its matches played to date shall be expunged from the League tables.
4. If a club is unable to honour a fixture it must concede the match which its lowest XI is due to play that day.
5. For the purposes of this playing condition, a team shall comprise no fewer than eight players.

9. POINTS SYSTEM

1. Twenty points shall be awarded for a win, with no points for a defeat. Five points shall be awarded for a tie. A tie is recognised as both sides having equal scores and equal wickets lost; where scores are equal the team losing the fewer wickets shall be deemed the winner.
2. In addition the following bonus points shall be awarded to the losing or tying sides:

60 runs	1 point	2 wickets	1 point
90 runs	2 points	4 wickets	2 points
120 runs	3 points	6 wickets	3 points
150 runs	4 points	8 wickets	4 points
180 runs	5 points	10 wickets	5 points
3. When a side does not have its full complement of 11 players it is deemed to be all out when their last wicket falls and consequently 5 bonus bowling points are awarded to the fielding side. Full bonus bowling points are also awarded to the fielding side if a side declares its innings closed.
4. No points shall be awarded in the event of a game being abandoned prior to commencement or whilst in progress before a result can be obtained under Playing Condition 7.
5. It shall be the duty of the captain of the team batting second to ascertain between innings the total runs scored by the side batting first and to agree the batting target accordingly.



10. LEAGUE POSITIONS

1. The league positions shall be decided by the average points per game played. The average shall be determined by dividing the number of games actually played and completed (ie excluding abandoned games) into the total points obtained from those games. In the event of two or more teams having an identical average, the league position will be determined by reference to the result of the match (or the matches) between the teams concerned, ie the winning team shall be placed higher. If this method is inconclusive (eg where both teams won one match, or where the match is tied or abandoned, or where more than two teams are concerned) the team scoring most runs per wicket throughout the season shall be placed higher.

11. PLAYERS ELIGIBLE TO PLAY

1. A player is ineligible to play in the League if during the current season he has played first class cricket or second XI County Cricket or in the Minor Counties.
2. A player may play for only one club in the League during any one season, unless written permission is given by the Rules/Playing Conditions Committee. Permission to play for another club in the League shall not be granted after 31 July. Any complaint that this playing condition may have been transgressed must be made in writing to the General Secretary within 7 days of the relevant game.
3. Any player engaged in a League fixture, shall not participate in any other cricket match during the same playing time.
4. Clubs are expected to field their strongest available sides in all matches. In addition, in any case where a club's first XI does not have a League fixture, clubs are expected to select their second (and other) XIs from players who would normally be expected to play in those particular XIs.
5. If the Executive Committee becomes aware of a possible infringement of Playing Condition 11 within 7 days of the relevant match, the Executive Committee may require the club concerned to provide an explanation and take any action it considers appropriate.
6. If the Executive Committee becomes aware, within 7 days of the relevant match, that a team may have played a player of a notably higher standard than the normal level of that division, and that player has had an undue influence on the result of the match, it may take any action it considers appropriate.



PLAYING CONDITIONS

12. UMPIRES

1. Subject to availability, two independent umpires shall be appointed to each match in the Premier Division. Each team shall pay one umpire his/her fee of £40 before the match commences. If there is only one umpire each team shall pay him/her £30 before the match commences.
2. If only one umpire is appointed, he shall stand at the bowler's end for the full match and the batting side must provide an umpire at the striker's end. Should an independent umpire not be available, both teams must provide a non-playing umpire for the full match.
3. Independent umpires may be appointed to matches in the lower divisions. If so, they will be paid by the League. If independent umpires are appointed to matches in the lower divisions at the request of a club or both clubs, it will be at the expense of the club(s) which request the appointment.
4. If a match is abandoned due to the weather or any exceptional circumstance, and the umpire is notified before he has set off for the ground, the umpire's fee is not applicable. Should the umpire set off for or arrive at the ground and the match is abandoned without a ball being bowled, he is entitled to half his fee, the costs shared equally between the two sides. Should a ball be bowled and the match is abandoned, the umpire is entitled to his full fee. If a match is abandoned early (eg. by a groundsman) it is the responsibility of the home side to notify the umpires (and opponents), and if it fails to do so and the umpires travel to the ground, the home side must pay their half fees.
5. In any division of the league where (a) League umpire(s) is/are not appointed, the clubs will each nominate a playing or non-playing umpire to officiate a match. The nominated persons will have good knowledge of the Laws of Cricket and apply them impartially. These arrangements must be agreed by the captains prior to the commencement of play.
6. If a club wishes to use a qualified or partially qualified person to umpire their matches on a regular basis then the procedure listed below should be followed to obtain a status from the League as 'Authorised Non-Panel Umpire (ANPU)'.
 1. Provide curriculum vitae of the person who would like to be appointed as an ANPU.
 2. Provide ACO membership number.
 3. Provide copy of any certificates.
 4. Disclosure and Barring Service (DBS) certificate.
7. If a person is appointed as an ANPU, he shall have the same authority as a panel umpire. All clubs will be informed of the appointment so that it is clear an ANPU will umpire during the whole match.
8. The payment of the ANPU is a matter between him and his club.
9. A club non-playing umpire, who has not been registered with the League as an ANPU, shall not be entitled to stand during the opponents' innings unless the opposing captain agrees.





13. NOTIFICATION OF RESULTS

1. At the completion of the match, the HOME team captain or an appointed member of the team will go through the scorecards with the AWAY team captain or an appointed member of the team and agree the accuracy of the scorecards. Any missing information must be completed at this stage: names of batsmen, names of fielders, names of bowlers, score by each batsman, bowling figures of each bowler (including no balls and wides), extras (byes, leg-byes), fall of wickets and name of batsman. The batting totals and bowling totals shall tally and any errors shall be corrected.
2. The HOME team shall enter the result, team scores, wickets down, overs bowled and bonus points of the losing team on the Play-Cricket website by midnight of the day of the match. This shall apply whether the game is abandoned, incomplete or conceded. If the Play-Cricket website is down and the above details cannot be entered, the details must be emailed to the General Secretary of the League by midnight of the day of the match.
3. The HOME team shall complete the scorecards on the Play-Cricket website by midday (12pm) on the Monday following the match. The AWAY team shall verify the result and scorecards, amending or completing as necessary, by midday (12pm) on the Tuesday following the match. This shall be done whether or not the home team has completed its action. All parts of the scorecards shall be completed:
 - Each team is responsible for ensuring that the names of their own batsmen, bowlers and fielders (catches, stumpings and run outs) are recorded accurately. i.e. a first name and a last name. (Recording of initials will not be sufficient).
 - With the exception of the opponents' players' names, the Batting team is responsible for the batting card – recording scores of each batsman, innings total (including the number of byes, leg-byes, wides and no balls), scores at the fall of wickets with the name of batsman dismissed, and the bowling figures, which must tally with the batting total.
4. Any falsification of scorecards or match cards shall be considered a serious breach of playing conditions. The Executive Committee may investigate and take any action it considers appropriate.

14. CRICKET BALL

1. Clubs will be issued with the requisite number of new match balls to cover each season's divisional fixtures. Each side must provide one new ball, to be used in each innings. It shall be of the type specified by the League.





RUNNING HEAD

15. NO BALL

Bowling of high full pitched balls (beamers)

1. Any delivery which passes or would have passed on the full above waist height of the striker standing upright at the crease is to be deemed dangerous and unfair, whether or not it is likely to inflict physical injury on the striker, and shall be called No Ball.
2. Following any delivery as described in paragraph 1, the bowler shall receive a first and final warning. Following a second similar delivery, the bowler shall be removed from the attack and may not bowl again during the match.
3. Following any DELIBERATE delivery as described in paragraphs 2 and 3, the bowler shall be removed from the attack immediately and may not bowl again during the match.
4. The ball does not become dead on the call of No Ball.
5. A penalty of one run shall be awarded instantly on the call of No Ball.
6. A No Ball shall not count as one of the over.

16. WIDE BALL

1. If the bowler bowls a ball, not being a No ball, the umpire shall adjudge it a Wide if according to the definition in 16.2 below, in his opinion, the ball passes wide of him standing in a normal guard position.
2. The ball will be considered as passing wide of the striker unless it is sufficiently within his reach for him to be able to hit it with his bat by means of a normal cricket stroke.
3. Any offside delivery shall be judged in accordance with 16.2 above. Any legside delivery which passes legside of the striker and misses leg stump shall be called a Wide.
4. The umpire shall not adjudge a delivery as being a Wide:
 - a. If the striker by moving, either
 - i. causes the ball to pass wide of him, as defined in 16.2 above, or
 - ii. brings the ball sufficiently within his reach to be able to hit it with his bat by means of a normal cricket stroke.
 - b. If the ball touches the striker's bat or person.
5. The ball does not become dead on the call of Wide Ball.
6. A penalty of one run shall be awarded instantly on the call of Wide Ball.
7. A Wide Ball shall not count as one of the over.
